- Start-up funding made available to countries;
- Set-up of Project Management Units;
- Recruitment of the National PACC Coordinator carried out;
- Set-up of National Steering Committee
- PACC Technical Meeting

## Progress to date

- All 13 PACC countries signed their Memorandum of Understanding with SPREP. The MoU details the roles, responsibilities and understanding between SPREP and the countries on how the PACC.
- April 2010, 12 PACC countries have received their Start-UP funding as well as the third and fourth quarter funding for 2009 as per the approved Annual Work Plan and budget. Funds for PNG have just been transferred in May 2010.

## **Mainstreaming - Outcome 1**

An important on the ground activity carried out during the year was the development of a climate change policy for Niue;

Cook Islands had to undergo a change in pilot site due to the slippage in cofinancing when the PACC project approval was delayed.

## **Mainstreaming - Outcome 1**

At the regional level:

- two guides (Mainstreaming and Socioeconomics) are being developed and will be presented at the MPR

Economic tool – yet to be developed.

- Generally most of the countries are undergoing assessments at present that would lead to adaptation implementation at the pilot site level;
- In the food security sector Solomon Islands had carried out visits and consultations in Lord Howe;
- Palau PACC Core Team are already visiting communities;
- Fiji Departmental consultations, Cabinet paper developed and submitted to CDC.

#### In the coastal sector:

- Samoa has carried out community consultations and V&A with Tafitoala;
- Also working closely with Dr Webb at SOPAC to assist in coastal processes assessments;
- Cook Islands had carried out preliminary assessments of the pilot site and have also undertaken preliminary design work on the Mangaia harbour,

In the water sector:

Tuvalu – V&A Training [PACC PM, SEI, IISD]; Community V&A

Nauru - Preliminary assessments undertaken;

Working on baseline using draft water plan developed on behalf of WHO in 2001



## Challenges

- Project recruitment proving difficult;
- Understanding of climate change & adaptation approaches & actions is a challenge;
- Administrative challenges at national levelfinancial, political (pilots); Project management – particularly; development of AWPs etc. need upskilling;
- Reporting delays AWP, quarterly reports (narrative and financial);

## Comparison of 2010 AWP (final draft) & the initial version sent to UNDP - by Outcomes



### **IMPACT**

- Total 2010 AWP per final draft is USD3,646,788, an increase of
- USD1,578,222 (43%) over the Initial draft that was sent to UNDP.
- In the UNDP ATLAS system USD 2 million plus is already recorded from estimates.

#### Administrative/Political challenges

 PACC Steering Committees to assist in raising PACC profile and support at the political and senior administration levels of government;

National Action – issue to be discussed at Steering Committee level.

Regional – Project Manager to assist through country visits and meet with government officials.

#### **Capacity to implement - Administration**

 Further capacity building to be carried out at the regional and national level on narrative and filling in of Face Forms and development of work plans.

Regional Action - Further training planned for this evening

 Propose that a Core Operational Team to be formed at the national level to assist the Coordinators develop a AWP's and the technical elements of the Project.

- Consider the need to reallocate funds on the Annual Work Plan based on the PACC project document which is as follows:
  - Outcome 1 [Mainstreaming] 20%
  - Outcome 2 [Pilot Demonstration] 64%
  - Outcome 3 [Technical Support] 7%
  - Outcome 4 [Project Management] 9%

- Proposed that at the national level Coordinators to develop a Snapshot quarterly to be circulated to National Stakeholders.


