# Atiu glass crusher in action at school

Apii Enuamanu is making great use of their glass crusher. This is helping manage the school waste as well as glass delivered in by the wider community.



Principal Syaka Talangi-Tairi who is championing sustainability in the school says they were fortunate to source the glass crusher thanks to a NZ High Commission grant several years ago.

One third of the material used to construct a large concrete slab at the school, came from crushing 1300 bottles, and plans are afoot for more glass based construction at the school.

The glass crushing initiative started as a Year 7 student led project proposal which was presented at the Ministry of Education (MOE) Student Conference in Rarotonga 2019.

MOE organiser, Jane Tauarii said the students were encouraged to design projects with sustainability in mind and therefore the ongoing viability of the project was an important factor.

Glass crushers are available locally through Te lpukarea Society member, Timberland.



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### Liam Koka'ua home for a visit

Liam, a former Te Ipukarea Society project officer, popped into the office to say hello while on a recent visit back home.

Liam did a great job while working with us for 4 years. The variety of work provided great hands-on experience for him in the environment field, and he was fortunate to also work in a number of the pa enua.

He left Rarotonga in 2019 to pursue a Masters degree in Indigenous Studies, after which he took up a position with Gisborne Council managing a large scale ecological restoration project. It was great to see him again!



### Natura e te Moana e Atiu

Te Ipukarea Society's 'Eyes through the Lens of Youth' project has now extended to Atiu and soon, thanks to support from the US Consulate in NZ.

19 students from Apii Enuamanu in Atiu jumped in the back of trucks, armed with cameras and heads filled with ideas on how to best capture images of what the environment means to them.



The students were asked to contemplate and capture the beautiful aspects of environment such as the birds, forest and beaches but also to consider the not so pretty side of human impact such as waste, invasive species and marine pollution.

Berlina George took this beautiful shot in the Moko'era Nui Reserve. Berlina explains "In this photo I can see two trees connecting with each other and supporting one another. We may see it as a tunnel or a tree bridge, but I see it as two particular things being connected to each other and surrounded by small trees of life".

Here Terena shares a little about herself and the journey that led her to where she is today.



Kia Orana koutou katoatoa,

I am youngest daughter of Emm Koteka-Wiki of (Nga-Pu-Toru, Mangaia, Manihiki and Aitutaki) and Paepae Wiki (Te Aupouri) NZ Maori descent.

Born in New Zealand, I recently returned home to Rarotonga from the USA. I wanted to expand my knowledge and experiences, share what I have learned, but more importantly, reconnect with my heritage.

My upbringing has meant I have been fortunate to experience diverse cultures, environments and situations. I have lived in Croatia, Israel and Kenya and was lucky to also spend time in Rarotonga as a child and attend Takitumu and Apii Te Uki Ou Primary Schools.

From 2005 I went to school in Westport (Connecticut, USA). It was during this time that I



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connected with a number of Non-Profit Organisations, including Builders Beyond Borders (B3) program, which took me to Guyana, as well as the People to People International Student Travel program where I travelled as a Youth Ambassador to Australia.

In 2015 I commenced my studies at Hawaii Pacific University (HPU) and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Environmental Studies. My final major research paper investigated the environmental impacts of deep seabed mining.

While at HPU, I got involved with the Sierra Club of Hawaii, an environmental organization based in the U.S.A with a focus in preserving the world's natural resources. During an internship with the Marine Mammal Stranding Program, I was involved in the reporting and analysis of stranded spinner dolphins and whales.

I am humbled by this opportunity to work for Te Ipukarea Society and I look forward to learning and expanding my knowledge, as well as immersing myself into community work, particularly with our youth.
