Message from the Director General of SPREP

A team from your Secretariat provided support for our Members who attended and amplified the Pacific's voice at the United Nations Ocean Conference in Lisbon Portugal from 27 June to 1 July 2022. The Pacific Islands were represented by a strong contingent spearheaded by leaders from Fiji, Palau and Tonga. Also present were the Cook Islands, Federated States of Micronesia, Fiji, French Polynesia, Kiribati, Palau, Papua New Guinea, Republic of the Marshall Islands, Samoa, Solomon Islands, Tonga, Tuvalu and Vanuatu.

Our member countries reaffirmed the declaration entitled "Our ocean, our future: call for action", adopted by the high-level United Nations Conference to Support the Implementation of Sustainable Development Goal 14. They also joined the global call for stronger commitment to conserve and sustainably use the ocean, seas and marine resources as well as greater ambition at all levels to improve the health, productivity, sustainable use and resilience of the ocean and its ecosystems.

The Secretariat worked alongside Samoa, the Chair of the Pacific Small Island Developing States (PSIDS) and CROP to prepare the Pacific delegations for Interactive Dialogue themes, country interventions and negotiations in the lead up to and at the UN Ocean Conference. The Secretariat also participated in several side events that covered Ocean Acidification, Coral Reefs, Marine Pollution, By-catch, Depolluting oceans through controlling trade in plastic waste and combatting illegal traffic under the Basel Convention; and Ocean partnerships and science-based solutions for strengthening sustainable ocean economies in SIDS, Least Developed Countries and Landlocked Developing Countries and more.


