It brought together representatives from National Meteorological and Hydrological Services (NMHSs) in the Pacific, development partners, and the private sector with the main purpose of strengthening climate and weather services in the Pacific. It was a productive week and a half of meetings and pre-meetings, which resulted in the production of a Report and an Outcomes Statement, which will guide the work of Pacific NMHSs until the next meeting of the PMC.

Two important Conferences of the Parties (COP) also took place towards the end of August, in the lead-up to the biennial SPREP Meeting of Officials. The Noumea and Waigani Convention COPs convened in Apia, with a focus on key environment issues in relation to the orgaisational aspects of the Conventions.
