### THE PACIFIC AND THE EU SIGN **PROGRAMMES WORTH ALMOST EUR 32** MILLION FOR WASTE MANAGEMENT AND **CLIMATE CHANGE ADAPTATION**

Two programmes amounting to almost EUR 32 million were signed by the European Union (EU) Commissioner for International Cooperation and Development, Neven Mimica on the occasion of his visit to the Pacific. The programmes will seek to promote sustainable waste management and support adaptation efforts to the effects of climate change. They underline the EU's strong commitment to the Pacific region, as well as reinforcing the strong cooperation between the Pacific region and the EU.

#### WORKING TOGETHER FOR NIUE'S PROTECTED AREAS



Niue ratified the Convention on Biological Diversity in 1996 signalling its commitment to conserve and sustainably use its biodiversity. The necessity to conserve biodiversity is a genuine obligation shared by all Niueans, reflected in the establishment of the Huvalu Forest Conservation Area, which protects the largest area of remaining primary forest in Niue, covering 23% of the island's area, and is an important bird area (IBA).

SPREP as part of the EU ACP Biodiversity and Protected Areas Management Programme (BIOPAMA) was pleased to assist Niue, convening a technical workshop on protected areas in March.

# FSM DEVELOPS KEY ENVIRONMENTAL PLANNING DOCUMENTS



The development of two key environment planning and reporting documents – the State of Environment (SoE) report and the National Environment Management Strategy (NEMS) for the Federated States of Micronesia will further strengthen the country's capacity to protect and conserve its pristine environment.

A second round of consultations took place from 28 February to 1 March in Pohnpei with the participation of 40 representatives from environmental agencies of the four States plus DECEM officials. The main focus of the second consultation was to review and validate the draft copies of the two documents and which subsequently confirmed the trend status of the indicators for each SoE thematic area.

## REDUCE, REUSE AND RECYCLE: THE PACIFIC JOIN THE GLOBAL STAGE AT THE 3R FORUM



The Pacific Island countries (Kiribati, FSM, RMI, Palau, Samoa, Tonga and Tuvalu), the Samoa Recycling and Waste Management Association, SPREP and J-PRISM made a strong presence in the recently held 9th 3R Forum in Asia and the Pacific held from 4 - 6 March 2019 in Bangkok, Thailand. The Pacific delegation was among the 500 participants who gathered and discussed the transition to a circular economy and sufficiency economy. This year's theme, "3R as a Way for Moving towards Sufficiency Economy – Implications for SDGs", is very relevant considering the global issue on plastic wastes which, if not managed well, is polluting over our valuable oceans and marine resources. The challenge now is to put the circular economy and sufficiency economy philosophies in the Pacific context.

# SPC-SPREP PARTNERSHIP ON OPEN DATA ECOSYSTEM



The Pacific Community (SPC) and SPREP are strengthening their partnership and leveraging resources and technical expertise to improve services to the Pacific region through improved access to, and the use of, open data. To this end the two agencies of the Council of Regional Organisations of the Pacific (CROP) are enhancing the Pacific's open data ecosystem. Pacific island countries and territories and partners stand to benefit through enhanced availability of information to facilitate reporting to the SDGs, S.A.M.O.A. Pathway, Multilateral Environmental Agreements (MEAs) and national development targets. Recently, the SPREP Inform team and the SPC Pacific Data Hub team met in Noumea, New Caledonia to advance this initiative.
