PLAY OUR ROLE: The Tokelau Biosecurity Rules

Most of us would have noticed the vigorous Biosecurity operation campaigns of recent as advocated nationwide by the staff of the Department of Economic Development, Natural Resources and Environment both in Tokelau and at the Tokelau Apia Liaison Office. It is our business to ensure enhanced public awareness on this critical topic of biosecurity hence to safe guard Tokelau's food security. environment security, economic activity security and culture. Central to the biosecurity measures, are the lives of our current human population and future generations. Holistically, the Tokelau Biosecurity Rules 2003 provides the mandate for EDNRE mission in ensuring today's generation will not in any way, jeopardize, the opportunity for Tokelau's future generations to enjoy the pristine environment that is enjoyed by today's custodians - the people of Tokelau. Despite all that, and at the end of the day, we all have a role to play.

In this issue and the next Utuola e-Newsletter, the Introduction space will be dedicated to public awareness and informing the Tokelau people, friends and overseas families about the "Rules" and why public compliance is so important to biosecurity in Tokelau. To think of it, Tokelau is such that "small" that a small biosecurity and biosafety mishap can wipe out all of Tokelau's ecosystems including – human beings. The choice is simply ours!

The Tokelau Biosecurity Rules 2003 specifically serves 5 main purposes. They are:

i. to control the introduction and spread of exotic pests and diseases and other organisms, in order to protect the environment and the agricultural production of Tokelau; **ii.** to control the pests and diseases already present in Tokelau that have a restricted distribution;

iii. to provide for facilities for biosecurity services for the import and export of animals and plants, animal products and plant products, and other goods safely into and out of Tokelau;

iv. to provide for the containment and eradication of new incursions; and

v. to support international cooperation in the prevention of the movement of pests and diseases.

What is meant by Biosecurity

Biosecurity is set of measures aimed at preventing the introduction and/or spread of harmful organisms, in order to minimize the risk of transmission of infectious diseases to people, animals and plants caused by viruses, bacteria or other microorganisms.

What is Biosecurity in Agriculture Biosecurity is a strategic and integrated approach that encompasses the policy and regulatory frameworks (including instruments and activities) that analyze and manage risks in the sectors of food safety, animal life and health, and plant life and health, including associated environmental risk.

What are Biosecurity Measures

Biosecurity refers to all the measures taken to minimize the **risk** of infectious diseases caused by viruses, bacteria or other microorganisms entering, emerging, establishing or spreading in Tokelau, potentially harming the Tokelau population, our food security and economy.

Why is Biosecurity Important in Tokelau

The biosecurity system prevents or manages risks from harmful organisms, like pests and diseases. The biosecurity system helps protect Tokelau's biodiversity and economy, environment, human health, and a range of social and cultural values. ... stopping pests and diseases before they arrive

What is the difference between Biosecurity and Biosafety

Whereas **biosafety** aims at protecting public health and environment from accidental exposure to biological agents, **biosecurity** deals with the prevention of misuse through loss, theft, diversion or intentional release of pathogens, toxins and any other biological materials.

What is a Biosecurity Risk?

A **biosecurity risk** is the **risk** that exists when you deal with: any pest, disease or contaminant. something that could carry a pest, disease or contaminant (e.g. animals, plants, soil, equipment —known as 'carriers').

Divisional Introduction

The three very broad portfolio's of Economic Development, Nantural Resources and Environment (EDNRE) as its name suggests come with it three very distinct operations.

The Environment Division is headed by Ms Mile Olive Fonua, and is stationed in Atafu where the Department's Minister, Director and Head office is based. Ms Fonua commenced as a Manager of

Environment on the 1st of June 2020.

The division's core activities in helping the three villages in areas of Waste Management, Meteorological, Water and Hydrology, Clean and Healthy Oceans, Marine and Coastal Management, Seabed Mining, Climate Change and Environment Development.

Ms Fonua's primary aim is to work together with her colleagues and the communities to protect, maintain and sustain our beautiful Tokelau to a desirable status for now and also for our future generation.

Currently the division has ten(10) staff members including Ms Leuta Toloa (Environment Officer, Atafu), Ms Meleka Mativa (Environment Officer, Fakaofo), Mr Pateni Vakalasi (Environment Officer, Nukunonu), Ms Solonaima Mei (Met Officer), Ms Teagai Jasmine Perez (Met Officer), Ms Kilihitina Tuisano (Waste Management Officer, Fakaofo) and Ms Ruta Pelesa (Support Officer).

The waste management officers for Atafu and Nukunonu are yet

The Economic Development Division is headed by its divisional manager Mr Siale Eti Kine and is stationed in Nukunonu. Mr Kine was a teacher with 18 years of experience in the field of teaching. He was appointed to be the Manager of Economic Development Divisional on the 1st July, 2020.

The focus of the division is to support Small Business Development, Small Scale Tourism development and Advocacy and Awareness.

Mr Kine's aim is to enhance close working relationship between EDNRE and villages to promote and preserve Tokelau's culture and traditions.

There are four (4) staff members under the managerial of the Economic Division including Ms Faioa 'Ala (National Small Business Development Coordinator), Ms Sosefina Pase (Tourism Officer, Nukunonu), Ms Margaret Siauala Paul (Tourism Officer, Fakaofo).

The Tourism Officer for Atafu is still pending and will be recruited later this year. The Agriculture division is a new division that was formally established after receiving an endorsement from Genral Fono in July 2019. The Agriculture Division is headed by Ms Silia Pologa and equipped with appropriate nine (9) staff members and four (4) casual workers assisting the Biosecurity team in Apia.

The designated Agriculture Division staff members are Mr Tevita Vaea (Extension Field Officer), Mr Hans Wesche (Senior Biosecurity Officer, Tokelau Liaison Office Apia TALO), Mr Christian Perez (Senior Biosecurity Officer, Fakaofo), Mr Daniel Viliame (Agriculture Officer, Fakaofo), Mr Tofiga Teao (Agriculture Officer, Fakaofo), Mr Tupe Vaitoa (Agriculture Officer, Nukunonu), Mr Piita Vaipuna (Agriculture Officer, Atafu), Mr Famaoni Reuelu (Biosecurity Officer, Atafu), Mr Lili Ahki (Casual, TALO), Mr Siu (Casual, TALO), Mr Iakopo (Casual, TALO), Mr Semisi (TALO).

Agriculture Division will be responsible for helping the three villages in areas of biosecurity, invasive species, agriculture, food security, lands and soil management,

The biosecurity for Nukunonu will is yet to be recruited.

Agriculture Division Updates

EDNRE completed a successful gardening in Fakaofo

A garden competition is being held by the department of EDNRE amongst its staffs and people of Tokelau to promote healthy living, improve quality of life and nutritional values, to be self-sufficient in cultivation of their own lands and to be innovative of their own farming system in supplying their own food during these unprecedented trial times.

EDNRE staffs on Fakaofo have begun their home gardening ever since April this year. As of now, most of the growers have undergone their first harvest.

A former staff of EDNRE distributed seeds to some of the households on the island but due to limited of seeds received by the department from FAO, each household could not have any share of the seeds.

Apparently, most of the families have already harvested fruits of their home garden and are thankful to the department for their support in providing seeds and compost soils.

Whilst Covd-19 had took its toll on other respective countries, our people have took advantage of their time during the lockdown in cultivating their own lands and spending more time in backyard and outdoor gardening of various farming system. This also has learnt our people on how to be self-sufficient and resilient in which also results in a positive impacts on our people not only in physically but mentally.

In an interview with some of the families who have gardens, they expressed their gratefulness towards the department for being an example to them which have shown how the community garden contributes to community, healthy food access and food security, wellness and especially working in harmony with nature.

They've also acknowledged this initiative as they are not depending on imported vegetables any longer as they are securing and consuming from their own harvest with their hopes for the EDNRE's department for their continuous support on farming resources

Harvesting the fruits of hard work from home garden

Fourteen households in Atafu have reaped and harvested fruits from their home gardens including water melons, cucumber, cabbages, capsicum, long beans, tomatoes and other vegetable fruits.

Families were thrilled and thankful to the department for providing those seeds, compost soils, seedlings and trainings to assist them with their gardens.

In the previous years, there were only nine households who have been practicing home gardening but then were delayed for a while due to the shortage of planting materials and seedlings.

The department is now working cooperatively with number of growers who have shown interest in practicing their home gardens in providing more seedlings and other farming resources. It also motivates the people to have an interest in practicing home gardening to diminish the importing of agricultural produces from overseas.

Seedlings were grown firstly within the department's nursery before distribution to the gardeners.

With the blessings from Taupulega Fakaofo, EDNRE now has the privilege to carry out biosecurity checks every boat arrival day. Both EDNRE and Taupulega's biosecurity team now have joined together and work hand in hand in checking all the Agriculture commodities brought in from Apia.

The purpose of the biosecurity check is to eliminate the possibility of invasive species and pest entering Fakaofo, by checking all produces, such as veggies, fruit, taro, manioka, potatoe etc. Also, to improve and strengthen standard Biosecurity issues and enforce existing Biosecurity legislation in Tokelau.

Working collaboratively with the Taupulega biosecurity team has made the work load so much easier and much more efficient and effective.

A normal biosecurity checks during boat arrival days consist both teams in setting up our tent and table and armed with Morten fly spray to eradicate any findings.

All the goods that landed on the island are to be brought and transported by the Aumaga from the channel to our biosecurity check booth for proper examination and inspection before releasing to owners for collection. The checking involves the opening of sacks of Taros, basket of veggies and other fresh produces.

Preventing COVID-19 transmission during weekly Transport and Biosecurity operations

An invitation was received by EDNRE Biosecurity Unit and TSS Fetu o te Moana Crew to attend a training

workshop conducted by the Tokelau Public Health staff on the 21st of July regarding protective measures against COVID-19 during their respective operations on the island.

The surveillance team included Tenali Iosefa and Efoti 'Ala and each team member took turns giving presentations on COVID-19 origins and statistics, symptoms and transmission as well as precautionary procedures with demonstrations of such measures.

Greater emphasis was placed upon pre-emptive measures of action such as how to effectively wash and sanitise hands and also personal protective equipment (PPE) required by the respective teams when carrying out their operations. It was advised that biosecurity handlers and crew members alike need disposable gloves, hand sanitisers and disposable aprons to use during their operations.

Dr Alapati advices staff of EDNRE as the arrangement and execution of biosecurity inspections are imperative to the prevention of COVID-19 transmission. Therefore, biosecurity officers are to ensure to

- use a new pair of gloves for each unit inspected (box, basket, sack etc.),
- sanitise hands after each inspection before donning a new pair and inspecting the next item,
- wash hands with soap and water if dirt or other stains are visible on them after an inspection and to
- refrain from touching the exposed exterior of PPE when removing them.

EDNRE received a small supply of gloves, aprons and two large hand sanitisers presented by the health team to help with the biosecurity operations.

It had been a successful initiative as biosecurity officers took the advice and utilise it to biosecurity checking operations whilst continuing to identify ways of improvement for a better service.

EDNRE biosecurity inspections formally commenced on the 7th of July this year in Nukunonu following the implementation of the Tokelau biosecurity rules 2003 to prevent incursions from entering Tokelau.

Team Nukunonu Biosecurity Inspection kick started on the first arrival boat on 7thJuly, 2020.It was a very cooperative job shown by the taulelea with the support from pulenuku and the faipule.

EDRNE's Manager of Environment (Mile Fonua) led the EDNRE combined teams for biosecurity operation.

All agricultural products were fully inspected and to make sure they are free from pests, weeds and diseases.

Produces that have escaped through our team Apia's sight or smuggled behind Apia team went through our biosecurity operation where some root crops have not been cleaned. Our biosecurity team has to make sure to remove and clean all the dirt before consignee's collection.

All decomposed and suspected produce were disposed in a biosecurity trash for burning. This is to fully eradicate any bio-contaminated or bio-risk in which may harm our fragile environment.





Biosecurity team steps up its operation to address invasive species

The Biosecurity team under the Economic Development, Natural Resources and Environment (EDNRE) department is stepping up its operation to counter invasive species entering Tokelau.

As a small island nation, Tokelau is heavily dependent on imported goods from overseas as people are heavily depended on these imported goods for sustainable living. However, importing of these goods contributed to the increasing number of invasive species on the island, which may cause major harm to the island biodiversity.

In July, this year, the team initiated its first biosecurity operation at the port of entry in Tokelau as well as in Apia. This operation led the team to proper inspection of all goods arriving into the country for possible pests' infection.

On the island of Atafu, staff of the department work together to make sure there are no invasive species coming to the island. The work include proper preparation of paper works such as import certificates and cooperation with the Biosecurity team in Apia, Samoa.

Once the cargo boat arrives in Atafu, the team gather at the operation site for a short briefing, making sure that all precautions work are carried out properly.

In their safety gears, and wearing biosecurity uniform the team will go through the manifest and start allocating tasks as the operation continues. The team will then start close inspection of every load of containers, those containing food products are then transported to the operation site for further inspection.

Meanwhile at the site, staff will go through all products making sure that all cargoes are cleaned properly, and dispose anything that is suspected of posing harm to the environment. Once the operation is complete, the team will have a debrief and compile a report to be submitted to the manager.

This operation has been supported by the Taupulega of Atafu and

the Aumaga group which have shown support on this initiative and work together with the team. The team has carried out this operation over two months, therefore the biosecurity team have gained more confidence in their work. The team has also build their awareness on their rights under the Tokelau rules and roles as well as responsibilities while carrying out the work in the village, to avoid public scrutiny.

Tokelau had experience invasive species in the past and they have address the issue accordingly. In the past ten years the island of Atafu was invaded by the yellow crazy ant which have a great impact on the island ecosystem.

In 2015, NZ MFAT provided aid to carry out management work to control the yellow crazy ant. After three years of proper management and control, the number of ants dropped dramatically which was a huge relief to the community. In addition, ongoing treatment and spot treatment are still undertaken by the department as part of the management work plan to continue addressing invasive species.

Like many Pacific Island countries, Tokelau do not have the capacity and financial support to fight invasive species and take care of its biodiversity. Therefore, it is very crucial to recognize on a village and national level the importance of adhere to these biosecurity measures, and everyone need to play their part in making sure to stop the spread of invasive species into the country.

Economic Development Division is the smallest unit in the EDNRE Department. It consists of only five officers including the Manager of Economic Development, National Coordinator for Small Business Development & marketing and three Tourism Officers in each atoll.

We are currently contributing to the department to achieve the Department's vision which is **"Sustainable and Responsible Development for Tokelau"** to promote sustainable and responsible developments and practices that will preserve Tokelau's culture and environment for future generations.

Our main target is to develop Tokelau's economic by encouraging small business

development in Tokelau and as well as tourism. Our officers have been working hard to accomplish their annual work plan for 2020/2021 but we rely mostly on our department's budget. Despite financial constraints within the department, however, our officers are now finding ways that we can to continue our planned activities.

The Tourism Officer from Fakaofo has planned to do a Tokelau Handicrafts Festival, in this activity we are going to promote local handicrafts and various cultural activities of Tokelau which includes dancing, food, fishing gears etc.

In addition, the National Coordinator for Small Business Development & Marketing also planned some activities and one of them is to conduct trainings and workshops for Tokelau people, especially boosting new small business development in Tokelau. EDNRE department consists of three divisions – Agriculture division, Economic development division and Environment division. The Headquarter of the department is located in Atafu and all three divisional offices were headed by a manager with appropriate staff to not only implement divisional annual work plans accordingly but also to enhance close working relationship between EDNRE and the villages.

Tokelau National Budget 2020/2021 approved



The second General Fono or Parliament Session held on 3rd August 2020 at the Fakafotu Falefono.

The budget 2020/2021 proposal was mooted in parliament by the Minister of Finance and was approved by members of the General Fono. The General Fono also agreed to deduct all departments and nuku's over expenditure from their recurrent budget.

The program began by singing the national anthem then followed by a prayer session conducted by Reverend John Kalolo. Welcoming remarks were delivered by three elders 'Taumatua' of each Nuku before opening the meeting by Te Ulu o Tokelau, Mr. Esela Fofo Tuisano.

There were twentytwo members of parliament sat in the meeting and discussed the bills for the operation of the 3 Nuku and also the ongoing government.

Representatives of Taupulega (Village Council of Elders) from each Nuku were also involved in the GF discussions. The General Fono deliberations concluded on

Thursday 6th August , 2020 after lunch when the delegations of Nukunonu returned back home on the Fetu ote Moana in the afternoon whereas Atafu delegation headed back home on

Friday morning 7th of August.

Travelling restriction for visitors to Tokelau remained closed

Tokelau opened its boarders to its citizens, residents and immediate family members who were in Samoa during the lock down of Covd-19.

Returning residents managed to board on the MV Mataliki voy#19

from Samoa on the 26th of July 2020 while travelling restriction for visitors to Tokelau remained closed.

Fakaofo returning residents on this voyage presented their medical examination certificate from Samoa and also underwent travelling history and medical checkup again by nurses at the channel before scattering to their homes. There were twelve (12) passengers of Fakaofo returning on this voyage including 4 infants and 8 adults.

The Taupulega of Fakaofo had given approval during their meeting that these passengers were not to be bound for quarantined at Te Papa quarantine accommodation but to be self-isolated in their homes for a period of 7 days.

The boarders are now closed again for travelers until further notice except for shipment of food and bulk supply from Samoa only.





Figure 1: The bar graph above shows the quantity of business on each atoll

There are fifty one (51) small businesses in Tokelau. Atafu consists of 18, Fakaofo 14 and 19 for Nukunonu.

Most of the businesses are selling imported goods from Samoa and other overseas countries. However, only few businesses in Tokelau are selling locally produced goods.



The pie chart above reflects the picture of small businesses in Tokelau. Each Nuku have less than 50% of small businesses in their atoll. It shows that there is a need to encourage more people to start their own business rather than relying on their salary and other forms of income.

Most Successful Small Business

The problem of the COVID 19 affected most of small business development in Tokelau in terms of transportation, supplies of their products and restrictions of border. However, some of the small businesses were able to meet the need of their customers with their consistency supply.

Using of Available Resources in Tokelau in times of the COVID 19 is one of the major benefits for small businesses which is the usage of local products instead of importing from Samoa.

Tufala Tavite stated that they are trying to use all the available resources to carve, shape and fashion something out from those resources which are not used by the

Tufala Tavite also has his own private business for Carving. He normally used his spare times and Saturday to do carving for private orders. He has all the resources for his small business in terms of tools, equipment, knowledge, skills and dead trunk of Kanava trees and other trees available on the island. The carving Section and his own private business were running efficiently during this time of the COVID 19 because they have all their resources.

With an interviewed with him, he said that the dead trunk of the Kanava is using for carving and uses by Matiti School fe their Project. The students who were under the Path Way orogramme carried out a carving project by carving the School's name and different images on the trunk of the Kanava tree.

He was facilitating and teaching the students in the pathway programme to learn how to carve with the usage of all the available resources.

Environment Division Updates

New Incinerators ease waste management issues for Tokelau

The environment of wastes and consumption arrangement in Tokelau over the years has drastically changed following the procurement of three incinerators, to help with the management of wastes on the island nation.

In the last 10 years, Tokelau has substantial solid and inorganic waste management issues which pressure the EDNRE to look for alternatives to address the issue in a short-term period.

Following the decision by the Samoa Government to cease all importation of waste from Tokelau in March this year as part of its COVID19 SOE requirements, the Waste Management division under EDNRE overturns this challenge into an opportunity. The Environment Division with consultation with stakeholders, decided the best solution was to procure incinerators. The division feels the importance of reducing and proper management of waste in Tokelau, so as not to compromise the public health, amenity of the environment and the social nature of the community.

Through the financial assistance provided by UNDP's Global Environment Facility (GEF) Small Grants Programme, the ENDRE was able to procure three incinerators and 692 wheelie-bins, under the USD \$150,000 Waste Management Project.

The incinerators were officially handed over by Mr. Sorensen to the Tokelau

Government today, via the Public Service Commissioner, Mr. Tiso Fiaola, in a brief ceremony at the Tokelau office in Apia earlier today.

"These incinerators will help greatly in alleviating Tokelau's waste problem. We are grateful to be able to manage this with the help of UNDP and SGP," said Mr. Fiaola.

The first incinerator was presented to the *Taupulega* of Nukunonu on June 23rd, by the Director of EDNRE, Mr Mika Perez.

"We acknowledge UNDP's GEF Small Grant Programme for its kind contribution to managing Tokelau's waste problem," said Mr Perez.

The elders of Nukunoku were very pleased at this new initiative. "We express our gratitude to the Department of Economic Development, Natural Resources and Environment (EDNRE) for being at the forefront of national coordination efforts to manage Tokelau's waste management issues, and responding well to the village's growing waste challenges," said Mr. Pio Tuia, an elder of the Nukunonu *Taupulega*.

The incinerators will aid the control of waste on each atoll. Each incinerator will have the capacity to burn up to 300kg of waste a day including medical and biosecurity waste. The ash from the burnt waste will be used as fertilizer and other agricultural uses.



The department is hoping that once installation is set to go, a more systematic approach of waste management will be an achievement for the Waste Management division.

The Waste Management division hopes to set a clear direction for Tokelau towards minimizing wastes to the landfill, improving management of solid and inorganic waste, compliance with international obligations and managing wastes as resource to deliver socioeconomic, health and environmental benefits, by utilizing the incinerators for proper waste control on all atolls.

Nukunonu Waste Update

The Nukunonu waste management team have been very determined, proactive and committed towards removing the waste present on land, and always working to pack them for shipment to Samoa via the MV Kalopaga's ongoing voyages to Tokelau.


At the meantime, the transportation of solid wastes from Tokelau to Samoa have been ceased following the decision of the Government of Samoa as part of the Covd-19 SOE requirements. Therefore, the village rubbish collectors together with EDNRE waste management staff are working collaboratively in sorting out the different type of rubbish before burning them at the waste disposal site

The waste collection system generally operates well with collection twice a week and only change when there is a boat or other community program.

- Water garden early in the morning and at the end of the day to stop water immediately evaporating.

Over waters: East to Southeast winds 20 to 30 kph, gusting to 40 kph.


Rough seas.

1. Pursuant to Section 8, **TOKELAU BIOSECURITY RULES 2003**, and our collective effort to prevent invasive and alien species from entering Tokelau, the Public is hereby advised that;

a. (a) As of 10 August 2020, all Tokelau bound passengers, and/or consigners and consignees of any product outlined in (b) below will be required to acquire an **IMPORT CERTIFICATE**

b. (b) An **IMPORT CERTIFICATE** can be obtained from EDNRE Biosecurity Officers in Apia and/or in Tokelau for any of the following items:

- (i) Agriculture produces (root crops, fruit crops, vegetables) bought in Samoa or overseas.
 - (ii) Plants or plant products
 - (iii) Live animal or animal products
 - (iv) Motor vehicles, motorcycles, dinghy and machineries
 - (v) Dry containers
 - (vi) Building materials ie sand and gravel aggregates, log, timber, roofing iron, plumbing, water tanks etc

2. Pursuant to section 16, Tokelau Biosecurity Rules 2003, any person who contravenes or fails to comply with the **TOKELAU BIOSECURITY RULES 2003**, commits an offence.

3. To avoid any disappointment during Biosecurity clearance in Tokelau, all specified goods entering Tokelau must be accompanied by an **IMPORT CERTIFICATE**.
